## HE WHO DISPENSES LOVE, OBJECT OF OUR THANKSGIVING

November ushers in an aura of beauty that is proper only to its own when we first notice the signs: the attire of nature bursts forth in splendid colors, the chill begins to send a shiver through our spines and the thoughts of festivities, elegant table settings and good food tickle the taste buds. The thought of family reunions gets us all excited. Not far down the road will be the ultimate cause for celebration: Christmas.

Now, we're getting ahead of ourselves. Let's just focus on the matter of THANKS-GIVING. We know the history as applied to the beginnings of this national holiday in this country. It began with people who suffered in the old country from the loss of their basic rights to freedoms –oppressive restrictions and burdensome taxes. We know that freedom gives a people great room for growth, in more ways than one. These people were people of faith to begin with. They called out to God. Suffering has a way of causing people to drop on their knees to beg for Divine aid.

We can simplify the "anatomy" of Thanks-Giving into four parts: a NEED, a SACRIFICIAL RESPONSE, a SOLUTION, and AN OUTPOURING OF GRATITUDE. The last part is sometimes a forgotten part.

Back to the pilgrims, their NEED was relief from their suffering. God RESPONDED and inspired them to search for answers. They ventured into uncharted waters and, as pilgrims, they courageously sought and found after much suffering a new land where they founded a new life of freedom and productivity. These pilgrims did not forget the fourth element: GIVING THANKS TO GOD, a beautiful tradition that only this country mark as a national holiday.

Translating all these to our own salvation history, we go back to GOD, Whose Love made possible our creation and of all those that He provides us in our world. In St. Thomas Aquinas' words, "*Creatures came into existence when the key of love opened His Hand.*" When the Fall of Adam and Eve happened, Paradise was closed and the consequence was "*man will return to the ground from which he was taken.*" (Gen.3:19) The stain of Original sin marked us for trials, sickness, and great suffering.

Here came the NEED for us to be free from that enslavement of sin. In the Infinite Love of the Father, our Lord, Jesus came down to suffer and ransom us from it. God in His mercy made possible this SOLUTION of infinite value: the life offering of His Son.

While we are still in this material world, we are pilgrims. Like those in this country's history, our life on earth is a journeying towards our final destiny – perpetual union with God in heaven. It is the teachings of Jesus that tell us this core of God's commandments: to love God and to love others. We then must practice charity, the queen of all virtues. We then should be our brother's keepers. We must not limit the object of our charity only to the people we like for we are taught that that will not have any merit before God since evil people treat their kind the same way. The Gospel is filled with parables that show us such kindness as the Good Samaritan gave to a stranger in need.

As for those who receive acts of kindness, Jesus teaches us to be thankful to our benefactors. St. Paul in Thessalonians says, "*In all things, give thanks, for this is the will of God in Jesus, concerning you all.*." (Thes 5:18) Gratitude is expected from us by God because He continuously gives us gifts and graces that many times we don't recognize as such. We have a tendency to be lost in our joy for the gifts and become dulled by it. We see this in the example of the ten lepers when only one THOUGHT about going back to Jesus to thank Him and the Lord asked where the other nine were. He noted, too that the one who gave thanks was a "stranger. "And where are the other nine? Is there no one found to return and give glory to God but this stranger?" (Lk 17: 17.8)

A grateful heart is a humble heart. One who expects nothing in times of misery is not presumptuous – not demanding or forever reciting his experiences of misfortune. Thus when a response to his need comes, he is moved to tears, thanking God and thanking the benefactor. If one cannot return the favor in a similar way they can always prayers on their behalf as often as they can. The Holy Eucharist at mass is the perfect occasion for thanksgiving. The Greek words "*euchanstein*" and "*eulogen* "recalls the Jewish blessings that is proclaimed during a meal – God's work of creation, redemption, and sanctification. (CCD)

My nephew likes to say, "What goes around comes around." For every gift and sacrifice you give, the rewards will return to you in ways beyond your expectation.

On this Thanksgiving Day we should not only focus on thanking God for food, for material possessions. We should thank God for people, within our family or outside of

it who have been kind to us. We thank God for our community, and the people who make it a peaceful place to live in. We remember loved ones who had passed away. And when we finish our prayer over meals, we also should pray for those who have nothing to eat nor a roof over their head.

## A THANKSGIVING PRAYER

Most merciful Father, your gifts of love are countless and your goodness infinite. On this Thanksgiving Day we come before You with gratitude for Your kindness: Open our hearts to concern for others so that we may share Your gifts of loving service with all your people. We ask this through our Lord, Jesus Christ, Your Son, Who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God forever and ever. Amen.

Jesus' life on earth had been a series of unimaginable humility, of sacrifices, of that call for us to follow Him by emulating him. From the time He was born to His adult life, He suffered for us. The Divine status of the Savior made infinite the value of His life-giving sacrifice. The cost of our redemption cannot be measured.

Throughout Jesus' teaching, His lessons were on charity, on love for others for the love of God. The parable of the ten lepers shows us how to exercise sympathy and extend charity to the less fortunate. This means that we should be alert to the needs of others and respond accordingly. From the standpoint of us, the benefactor, we become like Christ when we do this because then there is something of the divine when our hearts are moved to extend ourselves to the ones in need. We are not to choose which people we give assistance to, for we are admonished not "to love only those who love you." (Matt 5:46)

From our standpoint as receivers of other people's kindness, we cannot afford to be smug. We are asked to examine ourselves, for if we are images of God, our thoughts, feelings, and actions should reflect God's goodness. We are admonished not "to love only those who love you." (Matt. 5:46)
