What is "instrument piety" or "instrumentality"? (see Lumen gentium 33; CCC 913)

The covenant of love with the MTA (Mother Thrice Admirable) is not only about personal formation, but it is also about offering oneself to God to help build up his kingdom on earth. In this sense, the covenant is *apostolic*. Essential to Schoenstatt's spirituality is therefore, the cultivation of our attitude and life as instruments of God. This is what is called "instrument piety" or the spirit of "instrumentality."

In reality, it is a very simple thing: in the covenant of love I express my willingness and desire to be an instrument of God. Through my apostolate and service to family, friends, Church and world, I cultivate a lifestyle of actively building up the kingdom. But at heart, the instrument also wants to be constantly attuned to *God's will*; here is where instrument piety meets *practical faith in Divine Providence*. Behind this is the need to constantly renew one's desire to see and do God' will and overcome the tendency to do only one's own. Here the Blank Check and Inscriptio dedications (that some members make) have led many to become more effective instruments of God. Here, too, the cultivation of the attitude of childlikeness before God plays an important role in one's becoming an instrument who is more likely to trust in God and fulfill his will. See this idea expressed also in Schoenstatt's first prayer of the morning written by Father Kentenich while in Dachau—very powerful words indeed to awaken us to our mission in life and our call in these turbulent times.

Father, I may awake with new strength to rekindle my love.

Let me joyfully greet you together with all your Schoenstatt.

We are united in the shrine where the flames of our hearts beat for our Mother Thrice Admirable who, through us, wants to build your kingdom.

We kneel in the Holy Spirit and sing jubilant hymns to Christ, who sends us with her as instruments to change the destiny of nations

A SCHOENSTATT TIDBIT - Who is Joseph Engling?

He is the "founding document lived", according to Father Kentenich who already in the year after Joseph Engling's death, in 1919, began to publish his letters and the notes from his diary in the Schoenstatt magazine "MTA".

Joseph Engling, member of the founder generation of Schoenstatt, from a remote village in Eastern Prussia (then Germany, now Poland), was a student at the Pallottine's School in Schoenstatt. He was not present on the 18th of October 1914, when Schoenstatt was founded through the Covenant of Love of Father Kentenich, and a group of students, with the Blessed Mother in the chapel that now is known as "Original Shrine".

But he opened his heart without reserve and made Schoenstatt his life; his diary notes and letters are a pure and profound reflection of the impulses given by Father Kentenich. Joseph offered his physical limitations, successes and vast experiences of unsuccessful apostolic commitment, his self-education, and the hardships of his life as a soldier on the battlefields of World War I for the growth and spread of Schoenstatt. On May 31, 1918, he offered his life for this intention. He died on October 4, 1918, near Cambrai, France.
